From the Leadership Team

We hope that you all enjoyed our Christmas services, as we celebrated the birth of our Lord together. A particular highlight was the return of our "Way Ahead" service for adults with learning disabilities; it was lovely to see old friends and they all seemed to appreciate the simple telling of the Nativity story, and particularly Santa's visit! All the services were well supported, and the Carol service in the afternoon, as dusk fell, was lovely. We thank Sally for all her hard work over the Christmas period.

As you read this, we will be approaching the period of **Lent**, and Sally is adding an Ash Wednesday service into our normal programme; do join us, the "ashing" is optional! Sally will also be leading, with Sarah Jones, a Lent Course from the Methodist church, called "Unbounded Love". This starts on February 20th at 1.30pm. The house group is using a Lent study based on the film "Chocolat"; we are meeting on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays at 7.30pm and everyone is welcome to join either or both fellowship opportunities.

Fellowship is one aspect that the leadership team have been discussing as we've considered how we can grow as a church. There is always wonderful fellowship when we eat together, and so we've planned events where we can do just that. On March 16th @ 4pm we will have a Spring Tea, on May 19th a Faith Lunch, and on June 9th the Church Picnic. More details elsewhere, we hope that you will join us.

Please remember that your leadership team is elected, or appointed by the **Church Council**, on which all members are eligible to serve. The next Church Council meeting is at 2pm on March 13th, and the Annual Church meeting will be held as part of our morning's worship on Sunday, 9th June. If you are interested in becoming more involved in this aspect of church life, then please let one of the stewards know that you would like your name put forward for the election of church representatives.

Our service to the community continues with our Community Tuesdays. **TLC and Bread Church** continue to be very well supported. The lunch on Bread Church mornings is especially popular. Our Warm Space in the afternoon has seen a small number of people attending, but we continue to offer a warm welcome with a cuppa and toast. We could do with a couple more volunteers onto the rota please, particularly for the afternoons, so please let Anne know if you can help.

Pre-loved (previously known as Thrift Club) is held on the first Saturday of the month, when we are also open for coffee. We have plenty of clothes for sale at very low prices, so please spread the word to anyone who might appreciate them.

We have a new programme for the **Big Local Night Out** at the Bridgehouse Theatre. This continues to offer an entertaining evening that you can invite your friends and neighbours to, at a very reasonable cost of £12 or £10 concessions. The dates are: (starting at 7pm) 9th Feb; 24th May: 18th Oct; 14th Feb 2025.

We have committed to running a **Holiday Club** during school holidays, building on the momentum from the success of the summer project. The numbers were smaller on the 2nd January, but we enjoyed our activities on the theme of "God's Promises". The next one is on Shrove Tuesday, in half term, when the themes will be around Pancake and Valentines days; please tell your friends and neighbours with children about it and that we start at 10.30.

I would like to thank everyone who works so hard, often behind the scenes, to ensure that Warwick Methodist Church continues to be a vibrant fellowship taking the love of Jesus to the people of Warwick.




SPRING FAITH TEA:

Our Letter from Rev Sally

Dear friends, my warmest greetings to you all.

This Newsletter covers February and March, and so covers all of the period of Lent and Easter, as Easter is so early this year. (Advance notice: the clocks go forward at 2am on Easter Day, 31st March!). So naturally my thoughts have turned towards Easter as I write this Newsletter.

Last year I was writing about looking forward to Ordination and all that that day meant and involved; time has certainly sped by since then, with so much joy, gladness and blessing amidst the challenges that ministerial life brings. This year, I am very pleased to be able to tell you that, in addition to our usual services on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Day, we will also be able to mark the beginning of Lent together on Ash Wednesday at 7pm.

As I write it is the eve of the District Ministerial Retreat: you may remember that the Birmingham District of the Methodist Church will, at some point, be merging with the Wolverhampton and Shrewsbury District, to form a new West Midlands District. So, this year, ministers from both Districts have been invited to attend the Purley Chase Centre in Atherstone (known affectionately as the Pearly Gates!) for a retreat which this year highlights the writings of one of the most astonishing Christian medieval mystics, Julian of Norwich. This woman has come to be known as Julian due to the fact that she lived as an anchoress, a name for a female religious recluse, in St. Julian's Church in Norwich. We do not know her actual name. The intensely spiritual life that she led was shaped by visions she experienced when gravely ill and close to death, aged 31, and she wrote the fruits of her meditations, her 'Revelations of Divine Love', in short form around 1373 and in longer form twenty years later. Her writings emerge from a time when the population of Norwich was being ravaged by the Black Death - some estimates place the numbers of people who died as high as 70%*. Her visions are extraordinary, Perhaps one of her most famous is that of the hazelnut:-

"The Spirit showed me a tiny thing the size of a hazelnut, as round as a ball and so small I could hold it in the palm of my hand. I looked at it in my mind's eye and wondered, "What is this?" The answer came to me: "This is everything that has been made. This is all Creation." It was so small that I marvelled it could endure; such a tiny thing seemed likely to simply fall into nothingness.

Again the answer came to my thoughts: "It lasts, and it will always last, because God loves it."

Of course, these days we know so much more about the universe we are such a tiny part of, so Julian's vision, given at a time when such scientific knowledge was unattainable, seems even more remarkable.

Another of Julian's phrases that has become well-known is:

Love was the meaning in everything God had shown me.

As we approach Lent and Easter, this is a wonderful phrase on which to base our thoughts. Everything we will pray, read, sing, reflect on and experience this Easter is about God's love for us. Love underpins the Easter Story. On Ash Wednesday we acknowledge that we have not loved as God has loved us. Through Lent we are encouraged to take up something that reveals more of God's love to us, or enables us to reveal more of that love to others.

You are warmly invited to join Sarah and myself (the S Joneses of the world unite!) on Tuesdays at 1.30pm at Church when we will be leading a Lent Course titled 'Unbounded Love', based on Charles Wesley's amazing hymn 'Love Divine'. This will take place on February 20th and 27th, and March 5th, 12th, 19th and 26th.

On Maundy Thursday we remember Jesus' exquisite act of love as he washed the feet of the disciples, and on Good Friday his cruel death, the ultimate sacrifice for us, the ultimate act of love, which restores our relationship with God. On Easter Day we celebrate that love reigns, love defeats death. We remember that love is the meaning in everything God shows us.

The Easter Story helps us to say with confidence some other words that Julian wrote:

All shall be well, and all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well.

Whatever difficulties life brings, and we all know only too well how challenging this life can be, our hope rests in the love God shows us, the love we can experience each day. Christ's death and resurrection, which during Lent and Easter we are all invited to become part of, teaches us that all **shall** be well. I pray we will all be able to experience the love and the security that Julian knew when she wrote these words.

To close, a prayer by Ruth Burgess

Bless to us, O God, the fragility of snowdrops, the blossoming of orchards, the dancing of bees.

Bless to us, O God, the smudge of ashes, the Lenten journey, the blazing Easter fire.

Bless and silence us with wonder, O God of hope and justice. Gift us with courage. Warm and quicken us with love.

AMEN

May our life together continue to be blessed, this Easter season, and beyond.

Warwick District Foodbank

The foodbank is an outreach and relief project run by 15 of the Churches across Warwick, Kenilworth and Leamington. Our Church is an enthusiastic member of the 15

With 6 distribution sites across the 3 towns and a warehouse it distributed food to over 500 people each month during 2023.

For the last 9 years our Church has had someone on the board of trustees of the foodbank. Christine Fell served for 3 years followed by me for 6 years. Under the constitution someone can only serve for a maximum of 6 years before standing down. Therefore, I will be standing down at the AGM in May.

It would be great if there is someone from our Church who would like to serve God and our community by being a foodbank trustee. It is a very fulfilling role that I will be sad to leave.
