From the Leadership Team....



As we start the new Methodist year, we are very excited to see some of the actions from our Five-Year Plan being achieved. One priority is to make our premises desirable for lettings to boost our income and make them available for local community groups; this is being realised in the refurbishment of the Community Centre kitchen and ground floor toilets. This work will take most of September, and will cause some inconvenience, but will be worth it when we see the results. At the time of writing there have been some issues obtaining the glass entrance doors as quoted, and alternatives seem to be twice the price; I'm sure we will find a solution to this problem. We are very grateful for all the work that Trevor Blades and the refurbishment group have put into the planning process.

Our fundraising events have been popular; a good number came to the Quiz in June. We now look forward to the Games Afternoon on October 18th from 3-5pm, and the IGQ concert on November 29th. Our Christmas Fayre will be on November 22nd, with a focus on raising money for the church projects this year. Thank you to everyone who has supported our fundraising so far, please do tell your friends about these events so that they are even better attended.

Communication issues have been raised, and Sarah has been leading on the action to develop an effective communication strategy. We recognise the need to update our website and to improve our internal communications, and hope that you will see an improvement before Christmas.

We are also looking at ways of developing our pastoral support system, as the traditional model of a Pastoral Visitor with a "Class" is under severe strain as we don't have enough pastoral visitors. A buddy system is being considered and using modern technology to keep in touch where possible. If you would like to become more involved in the pastoral support of our fellowship, please speak to Janice Witham.

If you'd like to know more about the Five-Year Plan it is displayed on the noticeboard outside the ladies' toilet in the hall or ask Anne to email it to you.

At the time of writing, we are halfway through the summer Holiday Club and the children are enjoying the theme of Noah & the Ark. Around a dozen children and their parent/carer attend each week, we'd like to see more, but those that do come have a great time. We are very grateful to all those who have helped over the six-week period. Bread Church will start again on September 2nd; this popular outreach activity also relies on a core group of helpers, but we could do with some more support please. Please do speak to Trevor Blades if you can spare the time on a Tuesday morning, even if it is just once a month.

We are opening our church on Saturday 20th September as part of the Heritage Open Days fortnight. A number of people came in last year who appreciated the opportunity to look inside our building; refreshments will be available and volunteers to help should speak to Julie please.

Our Harvest Festival is on 28th September. On this day we will also be sharing in the celebration of Ken & Beatrice's wedding at Northgate 50 years ago. A decision on a shared lunch will be made nearer the time when we know the progress of the kitchen refurbishment.

On October 19th our worship will be at Whitnash, a United Service with Holy Communion. Our Civic Service is on November 23rd, when we will be welcoming the Mayor, town councillors and members of the Court Leet.

The Leadership team are always keen to hear from members of our fellowship, if you have anything you want to discuss please let one of the stewards know.

Our Ministers Letter



Dear friends, My warmest greetings to you all.

I have been pondering on the theme of faith. You may feel this is probably not an unusual thing for a minister to ponder on! But I have recently experienced one of those lovely times when a passage that I have read and preached on several times before yields fresh joy when it comes around again. There really is wisdom in having a Lectionary that repeats!

I recently preached on Hebrews 11. (As I was preparing the service I also received an email out of the blue from someone I trained with at Queen's. He had a very special mug which would come out for prayer group and it gave the following information: 'How does Jesus take his tea? HeBREWS it.' Anyway, I digress.) And I experienced that wonder of new insight in words that were not new. This is why we refer to the Bible as 'the Living Word'.

Who wrote the book of Hebrews? That is a question that has been discussed by many scholars over hundreds of years – and the answer is, we don't know. What we do know is that the Greek it is written in is high-level, scholarly stuff. Its overall form really feels like a sermon rather than a letter, which could be one of the reasons it still resonates with us and still stirs our souls hundreds and hundreds of years later.

The writer of Hebrews begins Chapter 11 with a definition of faith: 'Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.' This is, to me, a brilliant definition of faith. We cannot see or appreciate everything that God has given us or done for us, or that will be given to us and done for us — that degree of knowledge and wisdom is purely God's and belongs to God alone. Humans, of course are always striving for greater knowledge, greater understanding; it seems to be part of the human condition to want to push boundaries of knowledge further and further. As I write, the astronaut Jim Lovell has recently passed away. He was on the crew of Apollo 13, and, as well as being incredibly experienced himself, was one of the recipients of sudden and much-needed new knowledge from teams on the ground when there was an explosion in the spacecraft. (I'm thinking particularly of the hastily patched-together design of an air filter involving a

(I'm thinking particularly of the hastily patched-together design of an air filter involving a sock, tubing and duct tape which enabled the crew to breathe in the Lunar Excursion Module as it became a 'lifeboat' for the astronauts). What faith that crew placed in the support teams to bring them home. You could say that the whole space programme enabled humanity to 'see' far more than they had previously.



You could also say that this should have increased our faith in a God who has made this amazing planet to be our home. But humanity also has this propensity to miss the stunningly obvious. We look at our unique planet, becoming slowly aware that there is no Plan B: this fact should have been brought home to us by the extraordinarily beautiful 'Earthrise' photo of Apollo 8, taken in 1968. Despite the fact that 'Eighteen months after the Apollo 8 astronauts shot Earthrise, 20 million people took to the streets across the US to protest environmental destruction in the first ever Earth Day' (taken from the BBC website) we are no closer to finding unified, global solutions to the climate crisis. Seeing does not always bring understanding.

Back to Hebrews. After defining what faith is, the writer goes on to list heroes from the Hebrew Bible whose faithful actions are recorded in God's story. Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses and many more are mentioned. William Barclay, writing on this passage, states 'It is easy to argue: "Why should I refuse the pleasure of the moment for an uncertain future?". The Christian answer is that the future is *not* uncertain because it belongs to God; and it is enough that God has commanded and that God has promised... it was precisely because the great heroes of faith lived on that principle that they were approved by God. Every one of them refused what the world calls greatness and staked everything on God – and history proved them right'.

But is it only these 'giants of faith' that receive acclaim from God? Of course not! Sometimes it is the small, everyday carrying on, the 'keeping on keeping on' that is just as courageous and faithful as mighty acts. Maya Angelou wrote 'Having courage does not mean that we are unafraid. Having courage and showing courage mean we face our fears. We are able to say, 'I have fallen, but I will get up.'

Jane Williams writes, 'The Hebrews commentary on the story of Abram makes faith the air that Christians must breathe to live'. What an amazing image! It sums up why we feel drawn to worship and fellowship, because these vital expressions of faith are not just nice things to do, but essential, vital for our life as faithful believers. We have been thinking a lot about prayer recently, and deliberately so, because this is another aspect of our life of faith which is not just a nice thing to do, but absolutely essential. When James Montgomery, decades ago, wrote 'Prayer is the Christians' vital breath, the Christians' native air' he was summarising beautifully a profound truth of our life of faith. I wonder who were the 'giants of faith' in your life? Who encouraged you, taught you, journeyed with you to reach this point?

Faith, of course, can take you into unexpected places. Recently the staff team, together with volunteers from several of our churches including Warwick, has represented the Circuit at Warwickshire Pride, at the Pump Room Gardens at Leamington. This was only the second time the team has done this. Last year, I approached the day with several questions in my mind as to how this day might unfold, some of them a little apprehensive. I need not have been concerned – it was the most joyous day, and a privilege to be welcomed into that space and share conversations with so many people. This year was just the same – except without any of the apprehension beforehand. We weren't doing anything dramatic, just being open to chats and conversations. So many people thanked us for being there – it was humbling.

Perhaps we would all love the faith that can 'remove and sink the mountain to a plain', as Charles Wesley wrote. But such dramatic demonstrations can miss the point. God adores and honours every faithful action we undertake. Let's keep on keeping on, living and breathing our faith every day, and encouraging others to do the same.

Thoughts on Prayer

It seems that we have been talking about our prayer as members of Northgate for a long time. Probably we have been doing that for the duration of our Christian faith, but during the discussions at the leadership meetings we certainly keep cycling round that topic. Whenever we discuss our future growth as a church, prayer is always highlighted as a fundamental requirement. I do not believe that we will be able to grow as a church unless we are praying. There have been various times over recent months that we have dedicated to prayer – "Sunshine and Showers" study series in housegroup; Prayer Away Day at the House of Bread; services focused on prayer. No doubt you will be able to think of more.

There are many opportunities for us to pray — on our own individual schedule; at Bread Church; during Sunday services; at house group meetings; with our wider Churches Together In Warwick friends at the monthly prayer breakfast. We are blessed to have a prayer circle as part of our congregation, who remind us of church members and other people connected to our congregation who are in particular need of prayer. This is a wonderful list, showing the rich variety of different prayerful activities available to us.

Maybe you feel happy with your prayer life? I am speaking from my own personal experience, not from any point of expertise, but I always feel that I could be doing better. I know that I am not someone who finds it easy to try things on my own, and therefore I'm seeking other people who are looking to focus on prayer. I don't know exactly what form that would take, as it depends on who is interested! But I'm interested in something semi-structured that would support me to develop my individual prayer skills (with the aim of me praying more regularly and consciously). That could be a small group, with a prayer partner, individually (following a group session on different prayer techniques), or any other way that you can think of!

So I'm looking for other people who are interested in being part of this journey. I asked some questions after the service I was leading the other week, so I'll ask them again here: Would you be interested in a prayer resource session outside of Sunday service?


Would you be interested in joining a prayer group?

A Date for your Diary!





2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. In the Community Hall - 'Come and Sing West Gallery Carols' in harmony with Immanuel's Ground Quire.

Don't be put off if you have never sung with a choir before or a long time ago - it isn't essential to read music as the choir teach the parts line by line and there will be quire members singing beside you giving friendly encouragement and an instrument playing your line. All you need is to readily pick up a tune and sing out joyfully with everyone else and have a lot of fun doing it - in fact just as you do at Sunday services. It's a one-off for fun; you won't be committing to any further involvement. The carols are meant for community singing and not too difficult to learn; in some Derbyshire villages they still do it in the pubs, but they originated in church. If you're not sure if your voice is soprano, alto, tenor, or bass you can change round until you find a pitch register you are comfortable with. Everyone will have a booklet of words and nicely laid out music so, if you are a music reader, you will also be completely at home with these unique and joyful carols. This will be the fourth taster workshop in our hall, they've proved popular locally but so far no one from Northgate has come, which is a pity - I don't like to think of you missing out on this lovely experience of singing together in harmony to the Lord a new song! It's not too early to get the date in your diary to 'Sing Early for Christmas'.

7:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. On the same evening: A Seasonal Words and Concert of Music by Immanuel's Ground Quire - the choir that sang for our harvest festival service a couple of years ago. The programme will include a few of the items taught in the afternoon and the quire will encourage the workshop participants to join them in singing these carols but won't pressurise anyone to do so. All ticket proceeds for the church - towards our Community hall improvements - kitchen, loos and internal doors. Of course, by then we will be enjoying the improvements to our hall and it's possible we may still need to pay any outstanding costs but, if we're debt free, then it will be a good start to raising funds for the next stage in our community hall development.

I'll have booking details for the afternoon and ticketing details for the evening later in September. Like Village Voices and other local groups, Immanuel's Ground hire our hall for rehearsals throughout the year contributing significantly to our lettings income and helping to keep the church doors open - it's all part of outreach in a modern church context. So, it's important to come and bring your friends to the concert to support our fund raising, and what a fun way to do so!
